MERRICK LAUNCHES UPK PROGRAM

Merrick will be welcoming prekindergarten students to the school district in the 2022-23 school year for its inaugural Universal Prekindergarten program.

After receiving targeted funding from New York State, Merrick will be able to provide this program without any impact to local taxpayers. Eligible households were notified in the spring about the lottery and application deadlines.

Ninety-seven students will be served in district classrooms and at the Barry and Florence Friedberg Jewish Community Center in Merrick.

Three prekindergarten classes will be housed at Chatterton and two at Birch.

“The additional funds from New York State will allow us to educate more of our community, while maintaining all the staffing and services we currently have for our K-6 students,” explained Dr. Jill Karp, Assistant Superintendent for Instruction and Educational Services.

SCOPE Education Services will be running and staffing the program, along with collaboration by our school district officials. SCOPE already runs UPK programs in approximately 30 other Long Island districts. Its goal is to provide “opportunities for learning through exploration, play and discovery that build on children’s social, emotional, cognitive and physical growth.”

While this is a full-day program, arrival and dismissal for the pre-K program will be outside of the regular school hours so there will be no impact to our current arrival or dismissal procedures.

We look forward to greeting these 4-year-old faces in the fall!




Facilities UPDATE

To address an ongoing flooding issue at Lakeside, a new drainage system is slated to be installed this summer, which should handle the heaviest downpour.

Summer work orders include painting classrooms in all three schools, installing new ceilings at Birch and Lakeside, asbestos abatement and updating an office at Chatterton.

The playground at Lakeside for which the PTA donated \$90,000 is scheduled to be installed mid-September. The units that were just approved in the 2022-23 budget vote will be slated for next summer.



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
